This initiative funds 10 demonstration sites for  
up to four years to design, implement and  
evaluate innovative methods for linking persons  
living with HIV/AIDS who are in jail settings or  
have been recently released from local jail  
facilities to primary medical care and ancillary  
services. Interventions include flexible and  
suitable case management strategies that  
promote durable linkages and follow up as the  
person moves between jail and the community.  
The study design will assess the effectiveness of  
the selected model(s) in providing linkages to  
HIV primary care services for jail releasees and  
integrating services for releasees within the  
community's HIV continuum of care.

Executive Summary Excerpt: "African Americans make up 13% of the general US population, yet they constitute 28% of all arrests, 40% of all inmates held in prisons and jails, and 42% of the population on death row. In contrast, Whites make up 67% of the total US population and 70% of all arrests, yet only 40% of all inmates held in state prisons or local jails and 56% of the population on death row. Hispanics and Native Americans are also alarmingly overrepresented in the criminal justice system."
