3.	Can you clarify the difference between a provider and a sub-recipient? Or are they the same?	A provider is an organization that uses Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program (RWHAP) funding to provide direct services to RWHAP clients or to provide administrative and technical services to the recipient. A subrecipient is one type of provider agency, this term is used to describe the funding relationship of the provider to the recipient. In other words, all subrecipients are providers, but not all providers are subrecipients. The term provider encompasses the following agency types: Recipient Provider: service provider that receives funding directly from HRSA's HIV/AIDS Bureau (HAB) Subrecipient: agency or organization that receives funding from a recipient and is accountable to the recipient for

You should have contracts in place with your recipient(s) that outline the specific services that you can provide through that grant. Each grant could fund different service category types. We encourage you to reach out to your recipient(s) to clarify the specific services you are contracted to provide through that grant and to ensure that your contracts are set up properly in the Grantee Contract Management System (GCMS). Client-level data must still be collected and reported on the RSR for all eligible clients that are referred for the service.
