

Stakeholders, County Supervisors, and City staff took on tasks CDC/HRSA-funded HIV programs couldn't:

- Approached mayors in Phoenix, Maryvale, Mesa,
 Tempe, and Tucson to mimic Fast Track Cities efforts
- Approached state legislature to pass SB 1389, requiring yearly EtE progress report to the public (!)
- Syringe access conversations with media, legislators
- Lobbying to repeal "no promo homo" sex ed law

Project HHHome

A Successful Collaborative Effort to Help End the HIV Epidemic In Phoenix

- Priority: Arizona's Integrated Plan identified Homelessness as a Major Barrier to Retention in Care and Viral Suppression, and Statewide Goals were Established to Address Homelessness
- People: Partnerships were created between Ryan White programs and non-traditional partners who have expertise and resources in housing, education, employment and training.
- Practice: The Project HHHome Consortium identified specific milestones that would be met and identified diverse funding mechanisms to meet the goals.

Goals Included:

- Data analysis to identify true population of homeless and unstably housed individuals that would qualify for Project HHHome
- Infrastructure development to ensure funding can flow from RWPB rebate funds to RWPA and then to City of Phoenix for housing
- Procuring housing units for Project HHHome in a challenging housing environment
- Developing referral and reporting relationships with Education and Employment partners
- Complete the eligibility and housing intake for 50 clients by January, 2019
- Monitor the impact of housing, education and employment on viral suppression over the next 2 years

Successes

Collaboration between partners has resulted in:

- RWPB provided \$2.5 mil from rebate funds to fund Project HHHome for 3 years
- RWPA/RWPB/RWPC/City of Phoenix completed Intergovernmental Agreements for infrastructure and funding
- Data analysis identified clients that have current housing needs and provided screening, eligibility and orientation to education and employment opportunities
- Housing units were procured for 50 clients and clients are in process of being placed
- Baseline data was established to identify current viral loads and income level of all participants, and data will be collected to determine if health outcomes improve in this population
